Email Scams

I expect many of us have received emails which have turned out to be not what they seemed and sometimes they can lead into tricky or bad situations which may even cause us to lose out financially. Very often these scam emails seem to come from people we know who are asking for help. Please be wary of them and if in any doubt it is much better to ring the person they are supposedly from and check out the situation. Below are a few things to look out for if you get an email you are concerned about.

1. Emails Demanding Urgent Action

Emails threatening a negative consequence, or a loss of opportunity unless urgent action is taken, are often phishing emails. Attackers use this approach to rush recipients into action before they study the email for potential flaws or inconsistencies.

- 2. Emails with Bad Grammar and Spelling Mistakes Another way to spot phishing is bad grammar and spelling mistakes.
- 3. Emails with an Unfamiliar Greeting or Salutation Emails exchanged between work colleagues usually have an informal salutation. Those that start "Dear," or contain phrases not normally used in informal conversation with that person should arouse suspicion.
- 4. Inconsistencies in Email Addresses, Links & Domain Names Another way how to spot phishing is by finding inconsistencies in email addresses, links and domain names. Does the email originate from someone you correspond with often? If so, check the sender's address against previous emails from them. Even if it does look the same it is not a guarantee.
- 5. Suspicious Attachments

Emails with attachments should always be treated suspiciously – especially if they have an unfamiliar extension or one commonly associated with malware (.zip, .exe, .scr, etc.).

6. Emails Requesting Login Credentials, Payment Information or Sensitive Data

Emails originating from an unexpected or unfamiliar sender that request login credentials, payment information or other sensitive data should always be treated with caution.

7. Too Good to Be True Emails

Too good to be true emails are those which incentivize the recipient to click on a link or open an attachment by claiming there will be a reward of some nature. If the sender of the email is unfamiliar or the recipient did not initiate the contact, the likelihood is this is a phishing email.

If in doubt don't respond to the email but contact the person by phone. Be aware it is easy to be caught out.
