Home front Blessings

Our no longer 'student minister' Sue came recently to bless our (re)newed home amidst the shambles of the half-finished decorating and the fallen down ceiling. She had been before, just as the builders finished. At that time the downstairs was still sensible and the upstairs was bare, now the upstairs is almost finished and the downstairs is chaos. She approached us in church the other Sunday and asked "can I come and bless your new home before I leave". We agreed gladly saying that she was very welcome to come and see our chaos. She replied "I find praying through the chaos is the best way to approach such a problem". She came with the Methodist Service Book and I was mildly surprised that someone who is obviously so good at extemporary prayer would bring the service book. This led us into a discussion about the relative merits of extemporaneous versus formalised prayer. But the upshot was that in this situations using the service book was probably a good idea because we were sharing the same words which had been used by millions of other Methodists over the years, a thought which I had not considered before. The chat then moved on to our interconnectedness across the church commonality, of our services as a whole, because we are a Connexion, and this was another little lightbulb moment. However, one of the phrases in Order of Service for the Blessing of a Home is - 'Lord bless this house and Mova and Peter who make it their home. Defend it with your heavenly grace, and create within its walls a place of warmth, love and safety. Lord in your Mercy Hear our Prayer '

I found those words very moving. Because that is what we all strive to achieve in our homes and what is missing in so many homes in our own country and around the world. The news that a mother and two daughters had been shot with crossbow in their own home, that the people living in Gaza City have been 'advised' yet again to move from the remains of their homes to a safer zone to avoid the worst of the fighting and at the same time the reports of the missile attack on the Okhamatdyt children's hospital in Kyiv. Not places of warmth, love and safety.

Sue also read to us the passage from Ecclesiastes, as the GNB has it - *Everything that happens in this world happens at the time God chooses.* A time for peace and a time for war. Not an easy thought for Christian consideration. But that is part of life. We struggle to think sensibly about the wars in Gaza, or Ukraine or Sudan and cannot see past the intransigence of the protagonists. But viewed from the standpoint expounded by the writer of Ecclesiastes God knows how this will all work out in the end. And to that thought we need to cling. That thought stirred a memory from my childhood - *Will your anchor hold in the storms of life, When the clouds unfold their wings of strife? When the strong tides lift and the cables strain, Will your anchor drift, or firm remain?*

<u>Refrain: We have an anchor that keeps the soul, Steadfast and sure while the</u> <u>billows roll, Fastened to the Rock which cannot move, Grounded firm and deep</u> <u>in the Saviour's love.</u>

Not a hymn that we sing very often any more but an appropriate ideal when we are struggling to come to terms with the mayhem and murder we see all around us on the news. It was good to see Sue and for our home to be blessed and hopefully for it to be a place of warmth, love and safety. **Peter Farley**
